

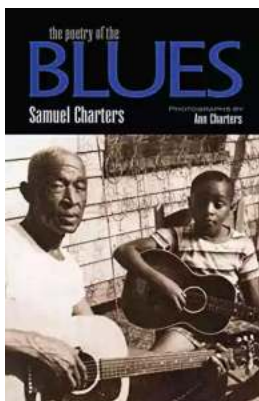

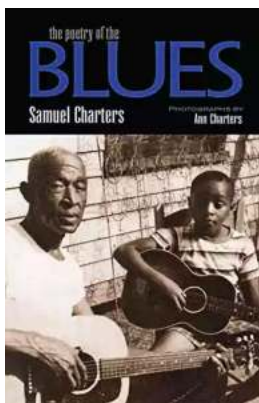

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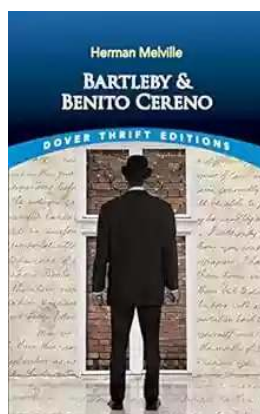

Musicologist and writer Samuel Charters (1929–2015) considered blues lyrics a

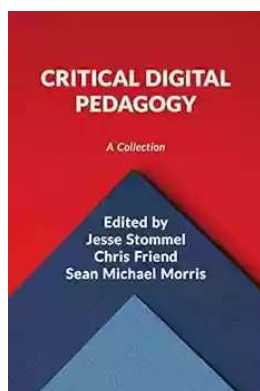
