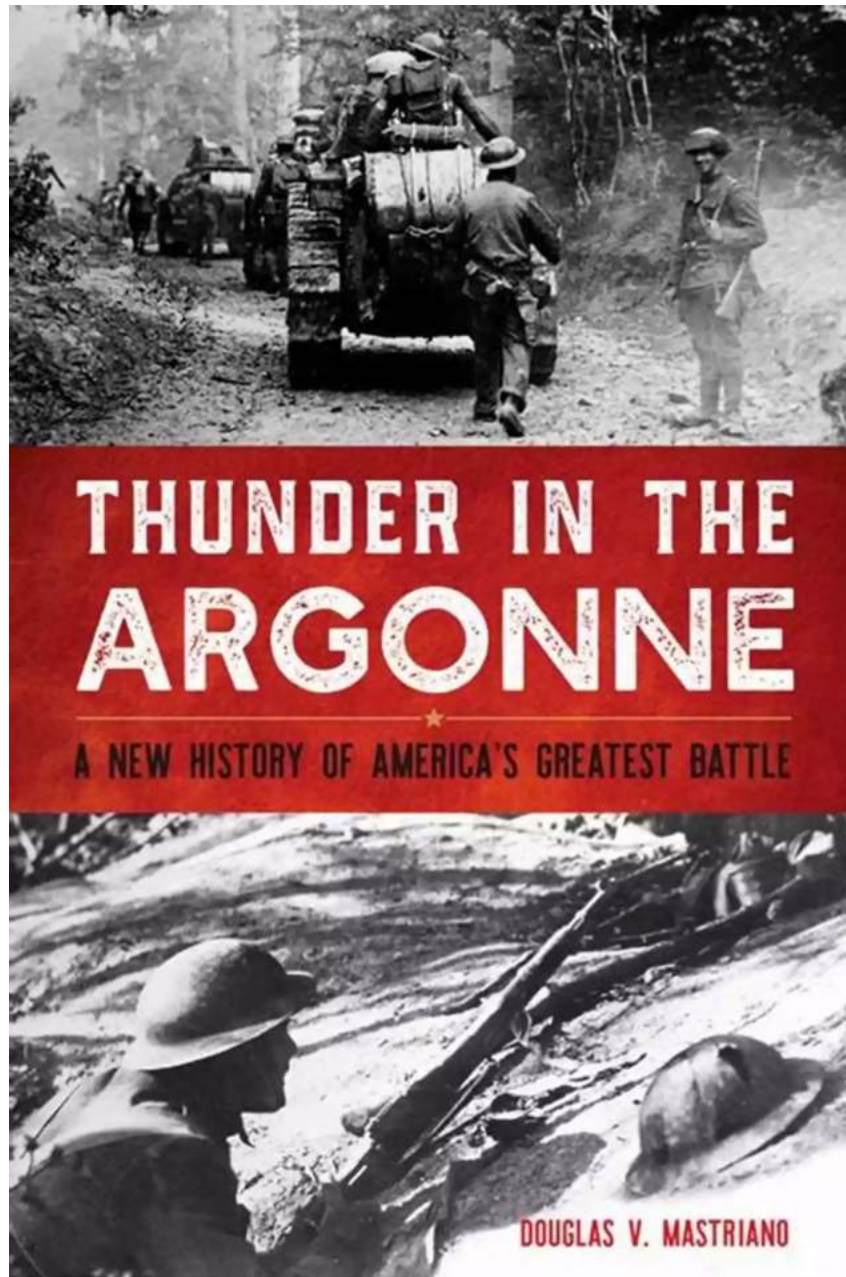


Thunder In The Argonne: The Ferocious Battle That Shook the Western Front

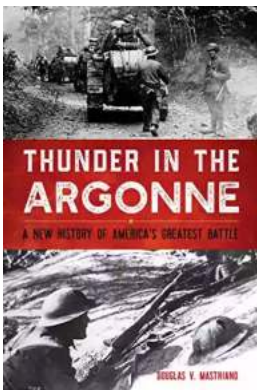
