


Some important reading tips....

- Answer the questions one by one with the help of the underlined parts of the text. Having read the text once, you will find it easy to find specific information by scanning.
- As soon as you find an answer, write it against the question on the question paper because you will not get extra time to transfer your answer to the answer sheet.
